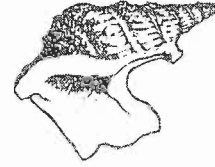

OFFICIAL OPENING 29TH OCTOBER 2010**

RESIDENTS MEETING 19th OCTOBER 2010

Mr. Philip Parry accompanied by Mrs Karen Howlett opened the meeting at 1 pm and welcomed those present.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING—VILLA RESIDENTS (Retirement Villages Act)

- Villa residents signed the attendance book which was being circulated.
- Apologies were accepted.
- Copies of minutes from last year's meeting, held on 24th November 2009, were distributed for perusal.

Finance

- Villa Financial Statements were circulated on 30 September 2010.
- Company finances were briefly explained.

Villa reserve funds as at 19th October 2010

- Capital Replacement Fund \$208,693.
- Maintenance Reserve Fund \$93,983.

Motions required

Resolved that:-

1. The Financial Statements as presented be accepted.
2. The Maintenance Levy remains the same per villa as the rate introduced on 1 July 2010.
3. The budgets for 2010/2011 be approved.

There was no General Business and the Annual General Meeting for Villa Residents was closed.

ADMINISTRATION MANAGER'S REPORT

Website

Jon is working hard on our new website and it is coming along nicely. If any resident wishes to supply a testimonial to be added to our site, this would be appreciated. Thank you to Dudley Jackson for his hard work on editing the site, which will be up and working shortly. The site holds a lot of interesting

information and will be worth viewing.

Accreditation Retirement Village

We have just completed and lodged our 2nd application for accreditation for the Retirement Village and should have a site visit in the first part of next year. We will be forming a committee to oversee the accreditation of the villas and will supply further details once this has been formulated.

We have also completed and lodged the application to have Parklands Aged Care Facility accredited, and have been given 12 months accreditation period.

Respite

Thank you to Anne Donovan and Kathy Browne for their hard work in helping out several villa residents who needed emergency care recently.

Health Reform

Hynes Lawyers, PRK Chartered Accountants and AQCI together with ACCA have conducted a report into Aged Care Reform. The recommendations use a commonsense approach into health reform. Nearly all the recommendations do not require changes to the legislation so they could be in place by 31st March 2011.

Suggestions were:

1. Empower the Commissioner so the Department and the Minister have to act on his recommendations.
2. Unannounced accreditation visits to only be conducted if a risk is present.
3. Change to funding to encourage providers to build more beds.
4. CIS to now be accountable to the Minister and to undergo training relative to Aged Care.

If you are interested in finding out more you can obtain a copy of the summary report I have prepared for the Board.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

Computer and electrical problems

- We experienced serious electrical and computer problems last weekend following power outages.
- Our emergency generator was damaged and did not start.
- This caused two-way radios and telephones not to work.
- The emergency generator required a new part to be installed. This meant that we had to shut down the Aged Care Facility and Torbay Villas while this work was done.
- We also had damage done to the WeCare Server.
- Other businesses also suffered damage (such as Wideline and Westpac) so electronic specialists were extremely busy and difficult to access.
- I would just like to give particular praise to Jon Dickson who has done an extremely good job in getting us back on line. Jon has been under extreme pressure to get Parklands up and running and on top of that he has had to contend with the problems at Torbay. Jon is also doing university studies and is preparing for his exams. On top of that he is under pressure to get the website up and running.

Parklands Retirement Haven

- ◊ Parklands aged care facility will be handed over on 20th October.
- ◊ We have our furniture and equipment arriving over the next week and a half.
- ◊ Torbay residents will have a sneak preview on Tuesday 26th October from 1pm to 3.30pm.
- ◊ The Official Opening and Open Day will be on Friday 29th October.
- ◊ Parklands is to be officially opened by Noel Squire M.B.E.
- ◊ Noel has been on the Board for five years and has been Vice President for more than 4 years. He is also Chair of

the Building and Development Committee.

- ◊ The Open Day will also include the villas.
- ◊ The first resident will move in on 1st November.
- ◊ One of the new residents will be a resident from Tavistock Court.
- ◊ There has been some good interest of late and it appears that some people have managed to sell their homes but the market remains very soft.
- ◊ Interest is high but people are unable to sell their homes.
- ◆ *Council Infrastructure Credits*
 - We have agreed with Council on the level of infrastructure credits.
 - We didn't get all we wanted but we did get a substantial amount.
 - We were very happy with the apparent change in attitude of council officers and this led to a speedy agreement.
- ◆ *The next stage (Stage 3)* is still on hold until we start to sell the Torbay Villas and the Parklands Villas.

Finance

- The Commonwealth Bank has finally received the valuations of the Torbay and Parklands properties.
- The loans have now been put in place.
- We have managed to pay the builder for this month without the loans so the only debt we may have is the final payment on Parklands.
- This is a much better outcome than we had hoped for, given that we have yet to receive any money from the sale of villas.
- The Production Kitchen is unencumbered.

Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting of the Company was held on Wednesday 29th September 2010 in the Tavistock Centre. There were no changes to the Board, with the four directors seeking re-election all voted back on the Board.

From the Floor

Q. Mr. John Warfield asked, as property costs rise would the residents have to meet the increase for insurance.

A. Mr. Parry said they probably would.

Q. Mr. Dudley Jackson asked if the Village Caterers surplus would help the Aged Care deficit.

A. Mr. Parry said the village Caterers would generate extra income and help cover losses, as they have met all their costs and had a surplus. Parklands was also expected to generate a cash surplus.

Q. Mr. Alby Bennett asked if it would be beneficial for Tavistock Court and Administration buildings to operate on a solar system.

A. Mr. Parry said it was worth looking at but not viable at this stage.

Q. Mr. Russell Clarke asked if the loan from the bank was against the villas.

A. Mr. Parry said the Queensland Government holds statutory charges over the whole property.

Q. Mr. Dudley Jackson asked whether the borrowing facilities with the bank were a loan or an overdraft.

A. Mr. Parry replied that the facilities were there for Torbay to draw on when, and to the extent, required. A low rate of interest was chargeable on the facility with a higher rate chargeable on whatever actual borrowings were

undertaken when drawing on the facility.

Q. Mr. Russell Clarke expressed concern that another company had recently gone into receivership.

A. Mr. Parry reassured the residents and said that it was unlikely to happen here. He said the borrowing was against the assets of the company, but in such an event nothing would change for the residents and we should not be concerned. Whatever was written into a residents contract would be kept.

Mr. John Warfield advised that any agreement was an agreement of convenience and not to be frightened of or worried about.

Mr. Parry agreed and said that although those other companies had gone into receivership their residents lives would not change.

Q. Mr. Henry Gay asked if a local business could advertise on our website.

A. Mr. Parry said it was a good thought which he would follow up.

Q. Mrs. Betty Patterson asked if the ground floor area of Parklands was low care.

A. Mr. Parry said yes, there is provision for 15 low care places, 33 high care and 1 temporary respite place.

Q. Mrs. Betty Patterson asked if residents here could use that respite place if there was none available here.

A. Mr. Parry said that it would depend on the circumstances.

Q. Mrs. Lynn Furness asked what the correct address was as everywhere they went it was different.

A. Mr. Parry said it was 43 Exeter Street, as well as the villa number. He said a form regarding this could be obtained from the office if residents were unsure. General discussion followed and a number of residents contributed.

REMEMBRANCE DAY

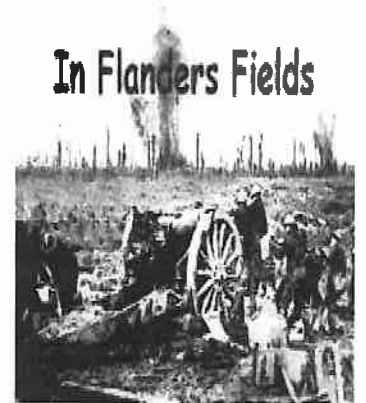
The armistice of November 11th 1918, brought to an end the worst war in history. "The Great War", as it became known. As one corporal wrote: "One sits and ponders sadly of those many pals who....have paid the greatest price, not willingly for not one of them but longed to live, return home, and forget the horrors of the past."

The red Flanders poppy which came up in spring across the battlefields of France and Belgium, became accepted as the flower of remembrance.

After a terrible stretch of treating men with horrific injuries, Major John McCrae, Canadian medical officer later wrote of it. "I wish I could embody on paper some of the varied sensations of that seventeen days.....Seventeen days of Hades!" Taking 20 minutes of valuable time he started writing a poem that became a lasting legacy of the terrible battle in the Ypres salient in the spring of 1915.

In Flanders' Fields

In Flanders' Fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row,
That mark our place; and in the sky
The larks, still bravely singing, fly
Scarce heard amid the guns below.
We are the dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved, and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders' Fields.



The Australians had attained an unsurpassed fighting reputation, out of all proportion to their numbers and were often used by the British command as the first wave of assault, leading to heavy casualties. The Australian commander claimed his corps had captured almost a quarter of all prisoners, field guns and ground gained although they were just 10% of the British Army.

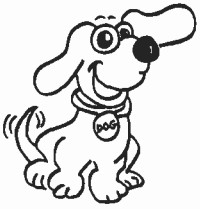
The Great War contributed to the Australian definition of 'mateship' as a shared experience based on mutual respect.

The 11th November 1918 marked the end of the bloodiest war the world had seen, 'the war to end all wars'. Of the Australian population of 5 million, 330,000 young men went to the Great War. More than two thirds of soldiers were casualties of the war: 60,000 Australian soldiers died and 156,000 were wounded or taken prisoner.

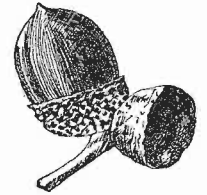

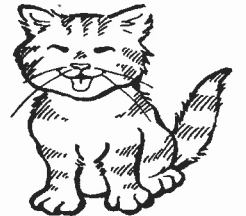

The continuation of Joe and Marj Hannant's story.

During the early 1950's they started visiting Fraser Island. Joe modified a Nash truck by cutting 45cm from its length, fitted a 4 cylinder "B" series Ford motor, Packard radiator, 4 speed gearbox, 2 speed reduction box and oversized 10 x 1120" tyres and rims to the rear with 8 x 25 20" tyres and rims to the front. A rear wheel drive but Joe claims it never got bogged or a place it couldn't go. All you had to do was engage 2nd low gear and away it went. At the end of each trip they would leave the truck on the Island, remove the battery to take home for recharge ready for their next venture.

In those early years a large number of horses were breeding on the Island and exported to India.

In 1964 Joe sold his share of the business to his brother and in 1970 Geoff sold out. Geoff moved onto Fraser Island and started the Cathedral Beach Camping Ground and built a general store. The camping ground stayed in his family until it was sold in 2005.

After selling their Butchering business, Joe and Marj, along with their children, moved to Nundah in Brisbane. They bought a home and snack bar. One year later, on doctor's advice, they moved back to Hervey Bay to improve the health of a child. The house and snack bar sold within two weeks. They rented a house in Eric Street, Joe was employed by the Burrum Shire Council, the local authority for the Hervey Bay district at that time. During the year with the council, he and another employee

were asked if they were capable of building a concrete bridge. The builder contracted was unable to fulfil his obligations. Joe knew nothing of bridge building. His workmate was confident so they set to and built the bridge on Bingham Road (the old River Heads Road) at Booral. It is still in use to this day.

During this time they purchased a block of land in Tavistock Street Torquay, bought a pre-cut hardwood house frame and Marj, every day, set out and nailed the frame together. Joe, his paid working day over, erected the section of frame Marj had put together.

Joe left the council and returned to butchering working for McLivers in Main St. for six years. Next move was the Torquay State School as the maintenance person where he stayed until retirement.

A number of moves followed. Another block at Urangan; another home. Next a block on Boat Harbour Drive with good water views; once again a house built. Whilst at this address Marj had a fall and injured her hip. One day a couple knocked on their door and asked to buy their home. This proved an easy agreement, the steepness of the block did not help Marj's damaged hip. As part of the settlement they accepted a 36' mobile home as part payment. This was their home in Coconut Grove Caravan Park, Pialba. The mobile home was moved to Magnolia Caravan Park, eventually sold and then into a unit in Elizabeth Street, Urangan for the next 11 years.

In 2005 they moved into Torbay Retirement Village and like many other residents, consider this to be possibly one of their best moves.

For a major part of Joe's adult life he has been involved with the Masonic

movement. On 19th December, 1953 he joined the Pialba Lodge and is 1 of only 2 members to receive their 50 year jewel as original members of the Pialba Lodge. In 1964 he was Master of that lodge which was formed in 1909. In 1973 he joined the Order of the Eastern Star (O.E.S.). This branch of the Masonic movement originated in France in 1760 and spread through several European countries. It found its way to America and in 1876 they formed their own revised version which has become the modern day O.E.S.

Joe's highlights within Masonry include membership in Order of the Eastern Star, Royal Arch, 18th and 30th Degree. In the mid 1980's he was a

member of the O.E.S. Committee to form their own Australian identity and to break away from Scotland. This happened in 1986.

Marj has also been very involved with O.E.S. Joe was Worthy Grand Patron of Queensland in 1991, while Marj was Worthy Grand Matron in 1997. During her year as Worthy Grand Matron, her duties took her vast distances from Cairns in the north to Melbourne in the south. In the year 2005/06 The Masonic Lodges of Queensland raised in excess of \$11 million dollars, all of which goes to nominated charities. Joe, to this day is still an active member of the Pialba Lodge.

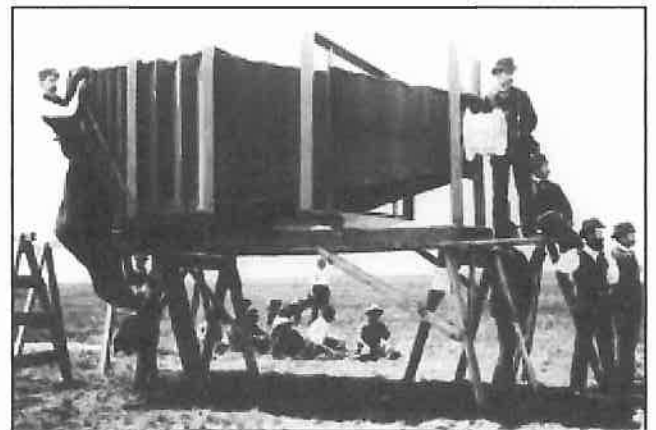

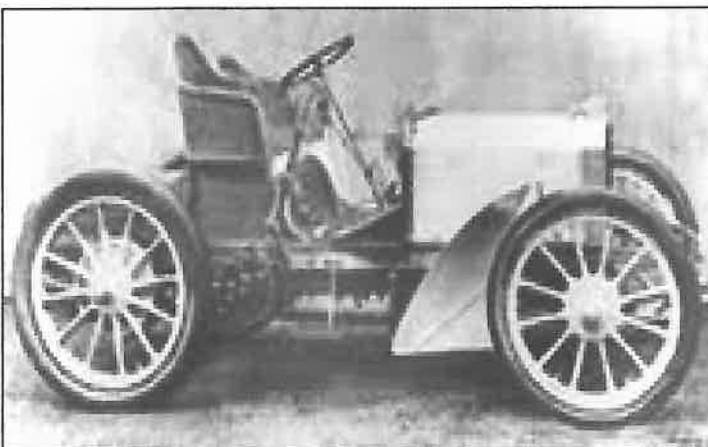
The biggest camera in the world

Daimler has built the first Mercedes car



31st March 1901. A revolutionary high-performance car has been made for Emile Jellinek, Consul-General of the Austro-Hungarian Empire in Nice. It is called Mercedes after his daughter and is an improved version of a model delivered to him by Daimler in 1899.

The appearance of this striking new car is quite unlike a traditional horsedrawn carriage. The four cylinders of the 5.9litre engine are cooled by water circulating through a honeycomb radiator; all together, these cylinders are capable of generating 35 brake horsepower.

Culinary Corner

Chocolate, heavenly chocolate! I'm sure everyone has special memories associated with the giving and receiving of chocolate. Maybe a first date, when he comes to the door, box of chocolates in hand and a very polite greeting to mum and dad. Then off to the local picture theatre. My very special memory is sharing Christmas afternoon and evening with my grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins. After our evening meal, it was time for the sing song around the piano. Then the big moment would come, when Grandad would bring out a big cardboard box full of assorted chocolates. Having spent all his working life at Macrobertson's Chocolates, he always received a box of rejects at Christmas. There were Old Gold chocolates for the ladies and chocolate frogs and rainbow chocs for us. It was a real treat once the icing melted to reveal the delicious chocolate centre.



World's Best Chocolate Cake

180 gm butter	120 gm melted chocolate
180 gm caster sugar	100 gm S/R. flour
1 teas vanilla extract	50 gm ground almonds
4 eggs separated	1level tabs. cocoa

Cream butter and sugar, beat in vanilla and 4 egg yolks. Fold in the melted chocolate, sifted flour and cocoa with almonds, then stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour into a greased 23cm round cake pan and bake at 180c or 160c fan for 50 minutes

Flourless Chocolate and Pear Cake

85g butter, plus 1 tbsp extra	3 eggs, separated
1/3 cup(75g) caster sugar, plus 2tbsp extra	3/4 cup(75g) almond meal
85g dark chocolate, chopped	4 ripe pears, peeled, halved, cored
1 tbsp brandy	Pure icing sugar to dust

Preheat oven to 180 or 160C fan. Grease and line a 22cm springform pan. Melt extra butter and brush over paper and sides of pan. Sprinkle in extra sugar and shake to coat base and sides, tipping out any excess.

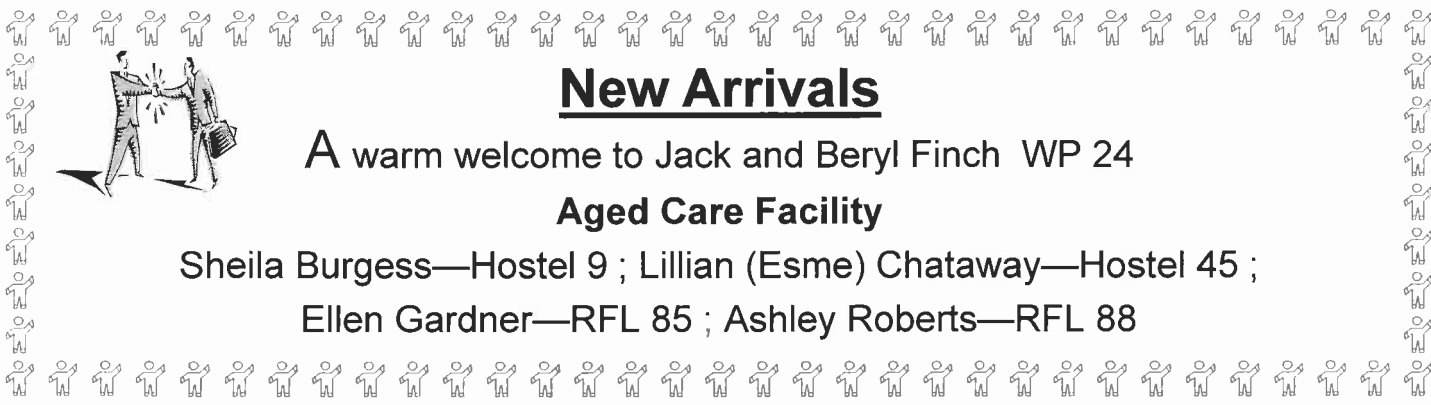
Melt chocolate and butter in bowl over a pan of simmering water, stirring until smooth. Remove bowl from heat, stir in brandy and cool.

Using an electric mixer, beat egg yolks and sugar until pale and thick.

Add chocolate mixture and mix well. Fold in almond meal.

In a separate bowl and with clean beaters, beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Fold gently into chocolate mixture in two batches. Spoon into prepared pan and use a spatula to smooth surface. Arrange pears, cut side down over batter.

Bake for 40 – 45 minutes, until pears are soft and cake is cooked through. Cool in pan for 5 mins, then turn out onto a wire rack to cool completely. Dust with icing sugar, cut into wedges and serve hot or cold.

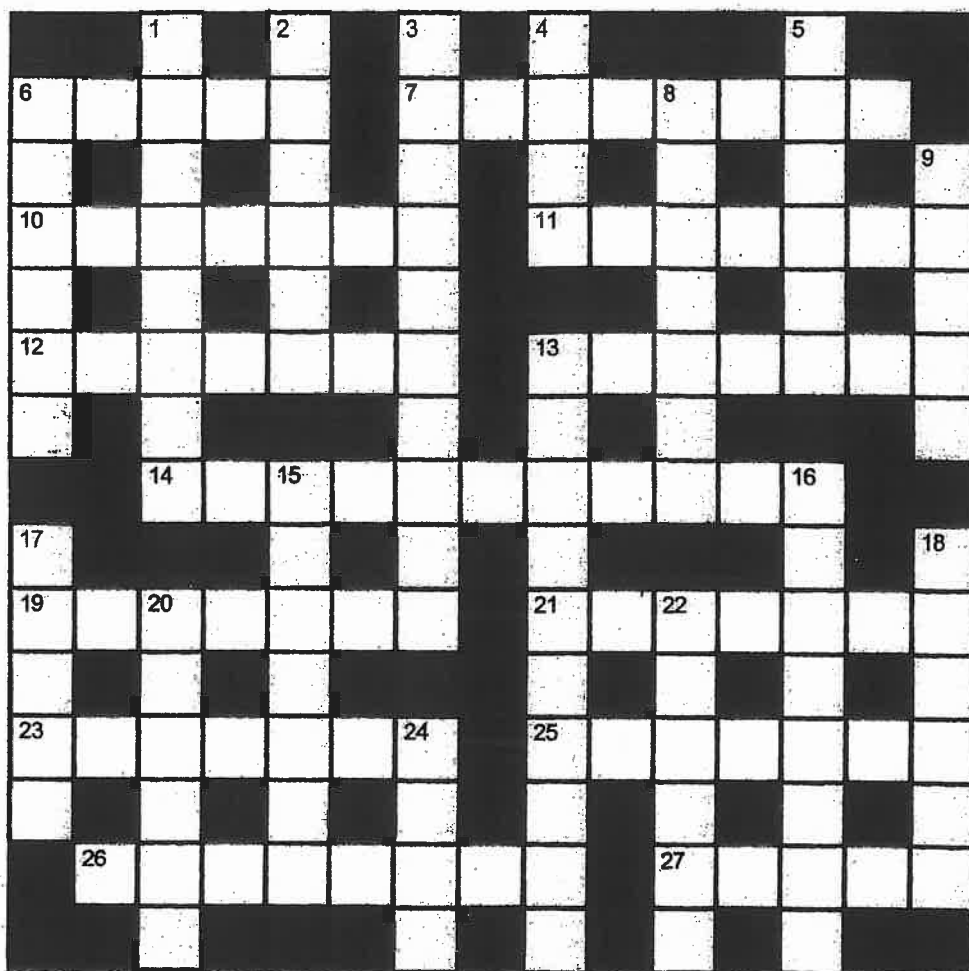
