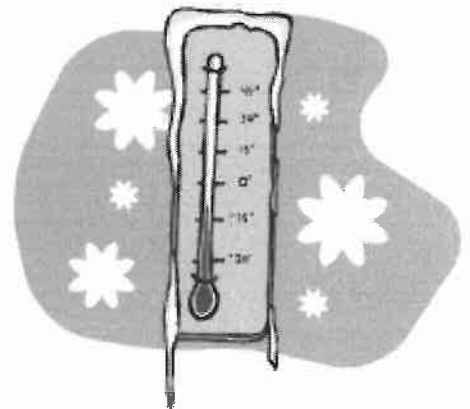

RESIDENTS MEETING 15th. JUNE 2010

Mr. Philip Parry together with Mrs. Karen Howlett opened the meeting at 1 pm and welcomed those residents attending.

ADMINISTRATION MANAGER'S REPORT

Budget

- A copy of the Budget was handed to residents at the meeting.
- As mentioned at the last meeting the budgets for the 2010 year had been completed and approved by the board and the Villa Finance Committee.
- With the announcement of the Fair Work Australia Wage increase and the introduction of the new Modern Award, those budgets have had to be reviewed to take into account the increase in the supply of services.
- The wage increases have affected all staff members across the organisation, some areas more than others.
- The results have meant an increase in the deficit proposed for the year.
- We have looked at reducing services where we can.
- However between the increase in utilities such as electricity, rates, water and wages, the only way to continue to supply the excellent level of service that Torbay Residents now received is increasing the General Service Fee by \$20 per month.
- We have run these figures pass the Residents Villa Committee and they agree that the only way forward is to introduce these increases from the 1st July.
- As these increases relate to section 107 of the legislation we do not need a 75% agreement from the residents to increase the GSF, as

they are actual costs and above the CPI increase.

- The impact on Villa Residents while great is no where near the impact these increases in utilities will have on anyone living outside Torbay.
- The average household is looking at an increase of somewhere in the vicinity of 14% in electricity, 8% to 10% in rates (remembering that most of the general service fee to Torbay is exempt) and possibly another increase in water usage which has already gone up by 24% in this current financial year.
- I therefore propose that the GSF be increased by \$20 per month as per section 107 of the Legislation.
- Mr. Parry then said that there would be a notice sent to all residents advising that there will be an additional increase of \$20 per month.
- Regarding the \$20 increase, Mr. Dudley Jackson said that as a rough estimate, 1/5 is for an increase in water, 1/3 in council rates and 1/2 due to the Fair Wage increase. He also said that according to a report in the news, water charges will again be increased heavily over the next few years.

Water Usage

- There is still concern regarding the water usage within the villas.
- We are going to start reading the meters and publishing the results so residents can see the volume of water used per villa.
- The plumber has tested the mains to see if there was a water leak from the mains but could find no evidence of any leak.
- Wide Bay Water have confirmed that there is no water usage between midnight and 5 am which

also indicates that there are no leaks despite them sending 3 letters telling us we had a leak.

- General discussion took place with regard to methods of saving water, including installing a computer program where water usage could be compiled, saving water in a bucket whilst waiting for the hot water when showering, those who use more water than the average to be charged extra.
- Mr. Parry said none of the suggestions offered were an option, and discouraged people from filling buckets with surplus water as a back injury could occur. The amount of money saved by these suggestions was quite minimal.
- Mrs. Evelyn Robinson said that she was concerned that the water from the sprinklers in front of the clubhouse was wetting the tiles near the letterboxes and this could result in an accident.
- Mr. Russell Clarke said that residents were not using the designated path to and from the clubhouse but were using the pavers through the garden area. This also could result in someone falling.
- After suggestions were discussed Mr. Parry said that may be a sign could be erected to warn people that walking through the garden is done at their own risk, and that may negate any liability by Torbay.

At the conclusion of this discussion Mrs. Miriam McNabb said that it was up to all residents to take responsibility for their own actions in matters such as this. All agreed and applause was given for her statement.

Security

- A wheelchair and a fire extinguisher were stolen on Saturday night. We do have some photos which we will pass on to the police.

- Parklands was broken into and tools and equipment damaged. The Builder has photos of these people and has reported it to the police.
- We have two people who have offered to live in Parklands, to watch for any further break-ins.
- Please continue to use your **emergency call buttons** if you believe intruders are on our premises, staff will contact you and then contact police. If you feel threatened, call the police direct but also call us. We will get there before the Police.

Server Upgrade

The server upgrade has created a few problems which we are in the process of sorting out. Due to the number of different operating systems, email and internet programs, each computer needs to be configured separately. Please be patient as this is a big job and we will have all the gremlins sorted out soon. This has taken longer than expected because unfortunately for us Jon's QUI exams started in the middle of the upgrade, he has also had to implement a trial for We-care new hand held devices, the Website and the new Winwatch system. Jon is working on it today and should have completed the upgrades to everybody's computer by Thursday this week. Have spoken to Two Tone about the issues and they have advised me that they are unable to help us at this time.

Banking

We have re-approached Westpac. Commonwealth Bank has come back with an amended proposal after we had increased the Villa Licence fees from their initial figures. Because of this they now want a valuation, at our cost and an increase in interest rates. Just waiting for the final proposal from Westpac. Hoping to have this finalised by the end of the month.

Strategic Plan 2010

This is completed and will be presented to the Board on 16th June.

Auditors

Our auditors will be here on the 9th August to 11th August to complete the audit of the financial statements for 2009/2010 year.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

Proceeds Of Crime Grants

An expression of interest has been lodged for a grant under the Proceeds Of Crime Act and we have applied for electric gates, cameras and additional lighting for the cameras. Expressions of Interest closed on 1st February and as reported at the last meeting, we are still waiting to hear if we have been accepted to go to the next step in the process.

Aged Care Facility

- The Federal Government has just announced that they are going to increase our subsidies for next year by 1.7%.
- This is less than half the rate of inflation and considerably less than the increase in our actual costs.
- Fair Work Australia has also announced an increase of \$26 per week for all workers. This is on top of the increases in the New Award which, in many cases exceed the pay increase announced.
- These wage increases amount to approximately a 9% increase. Obviously a 1.7% increase in income won't pay for a 9% increase in wages.
- We are currently reviewing our operations and changes will have to be made.
- Next year will be extremely tough and unpopular decisions will need to be made with implications for both staff and residents.
- There is no support from the Federal Government

Parkland Retirement Haven Villas

- Work is now proceeding with the final fit-out of the villas. It is looking good with the grass down and the landscaping being done.
- We are expecting the villas to be handed over in early July.
- We do not have an operational phone system at this stage. We are planning on putting 2 people into villas to act as security.
- At this stage we have not been pushing sales as potential buyers are having difficulty in selling their homes - there is also reluctance for people to move in until the Aged Care Facility is completed.
- The Board has asked Bellerio Constructions to quote on a design and construct basis for Stage 3 of Parklands which will be a further ten villas.

Annual General Meeting

Our auditor is planning on doing the audit in early August We are hoping to bring forward the date for the Annual General Meeting. It has usually been held in October with the Residents Meeting in November. We hope to have this much earlier this year.

Hervey Bay Seniors Expo

We will have two stands at the Expo this year, one for the Caterer and one for Parklands. It is to be held on 13th August in the PCYC.

Meetings

Residents. The next meeting is due to be held on 20th July.

Board. The Board meeting on 16th June was held at the Production Kitchen in line with the Board's decision to rotate the venues for the Board Meetings. The following meeting will be held on 14th July 2010 in the Conference Centre. This meeting will feature the annual joint meeting with the Villa Residents Committee.

From the Floor

Q. Mr. Alby Bennett asked when a permanent gardener would be assigned to Tavistock Court.

A. Mr. Parry replied that the permanent gardener in question was still on work cover, and until he has been off work for a period of 12 months his employment cannot be terminated and another employed.

Q. Mr. Russell Clarke asked for clarification of the residents internet email address..

A. Mr. Parry said Residents are using torbayvillage.org.au and the Administration remains with torbay.org.au.

Q. Mrs. Fay Thompson asked when she would be receiving a new phone. This matter had been brought up at the previous meeting but to date, she had not received a new phone.

A. Mrs. Debbie Bergman said she was unaware of this problem but it would be dealt with as soon as possible.

What I need are volunteers who will go on a roster, even if you can help one morning a month or go on a reserve list. If interested please ring me for more information.



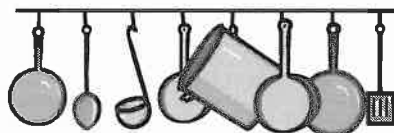

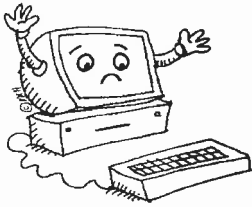

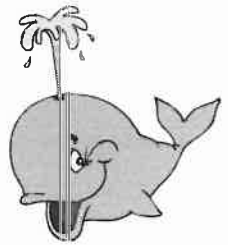

THE WRITER'S CIRCLE

Thank you Rae for this month's contribution, as it was related to Brian Harding and forwarded on for inclusion in the Torbay Times.

Rae Sutton was raised in Roma, Queensland. The population of Roma in the 1920's was around 6000 and today still remains around that figure.

Roma is situated approximately 480km west of Brisbane and the region is known for growing wheat, wool and beef.

Rae's Father worked as a fencing and ring - barking contractor and worked throughout the Roma district with his own crew of about 6 men. During School holidays she together with her mother, two brothers and sister would travel to the property where her Father had a contract and stay in makeshift campsites.

She recalls of events that occurred during those times:-

On one occasion a storm came through the camp and all the men had to hold onto the tent poles with all their might to stop the tent from being blown away. After the storm and the rain stopped, she remembers walking along the rutted car tracks and picking up handfuls of little fish and taking them back to camp, and to this day still wonders where they came from. The only explanation that seems possible is that they were picked from a dam or creek by a water spout and dumped by the rain.

Another time 2 workers came into camp assisting another who appeared to be seriously injured. His back was covered in blood and her mother attended to his injuries as best she could with limited medical supplies. It turned out that the 3 men were ring-barking a stand of trees when the axe one of the men was wielding slipped out of his hands and struck the injured man in the back around the shoulder area.

During storms with high strong winds Sandalwood trees have a habit of snapping and leaving long sharp spikes on broken limbs. It was after one of these storms that she found a large Wedge-tailed Eagle had been impaled through the wing on one of these spikes and was unable to free itself. Somehow her Father was able to handle this large bird of prey and remove it from the spike. Due to its injury it was unable to fly and stayed around the campsite and befriended them (from a distance.) until one day after returning from town with supplies they searched for the Eagle, but found it had drowned in the creek. It appeared that it had tried to fly but only succeeded in toppling down the embankment and unable to escape the water, drowned.

Around this time Rae's Father also worked on a sheep station and one of his duties every Sunday was to check the mob to see if any of them had been attacked by dingos. The dingo would come up behind the sheep and eat the hindquarters. He would then have to destroy all the injured animals. He also had to hunt and kill the many dingos that inhabited the area.

As a teenager Rae remembers a fund raising event that her parents organized. The family made 2 large batches of Fig jam in the laundry copper and held a dance in the family home, both events were very successful and the proceeds were the first funds that went into the building of the RSL hall in Roma.

There was a time before the war when a crew of German Geologists was exploring for oil and there was a mishap and a giant blowout of gas occurred with flames leaping high into the sky. The actions of Germany had the world concerned and the Geologists were ordered by the German Government to leave Australia as quickly as possible,

but before leaving told her family that if they had had another 2 years in Roma they would have discovered oil.

The Second World War was at its peak and Government at the time was concerned that Brisbane may be destroyed by bombs, so they established a canned food stockpile in the hall at the Roma showgrounds. Her Father was selected to keep this food stockpile secure and spent his nights sleeping in the hall as a security measure. There were nights when due to other commitments he was unable to fulfill his obligations and her mother slept in the hall in his place. As time went on Rae was also utilized in keeping vigil over the cache, to give her parents a rest from the loneliness of the long nights. She was not very keen to do it as there was only one very dim light and felt very vulnerable at such a young age by herself, but felt it her duty to do her part.

She recalls of the time when the Americans stayed in the area for about a week, they were building a road north. An American Officer came looking for her Father, but he was away on business, so they took her Mother and stood her before the assembled troops and told them that she was responsible for the food stockpile and if any Soldier was caught stealing any of the food, she had the authority to shoot them. She still wonders what her Mother would have

done if this had occurred?

Rae met her future husband Clarrie at the age 16 and married when she was 20. Clarrie was a Shearer by occupation but was conscripted into the army during the war and was sent to Townsville. The week before he was due to be sent overseas he went to assist other soldiers, to recover a truck which had become bogged, while they were unloading drums of diesel fuel off the back of it, one of the drums fell and severely broke his leg. He was transferred to Brisbane for specialist treatment and after 18 months was discharged medically unfit from the army. Until he was fit enough to return to shearing they survived by selling door to door, vegetables they purchased through Brisbane markets.

His shearing took him throughout Western Queensland and across the border into New South Wales. There were times when he worked in close proximity to Roma. It was then that Rae took on the roll of camp cook, it was very hard work as the shearers were demanding as to the quality of the meals they were served. If it wasn't to their liking they would go on a sit down strike and refuse to work until they got what they considered good tucker.

Rae and her family left Roma in 1960 and moved to Bundaberg then Hervey Bay where she lives to this day.

Culinary Corner

Mascarpone cheese is an Italian cheese made from milk which has been amended with cream, so that it has a very high butterfat content. The resulting cheese is very rich, creamy, and spreadable; the precise texture varies from very soft, like crème fraîche, to more stiff, like butter, depending on how it is handled during the cheese making process. This cheese is native to the Lombardy region of Italy where it is used in both desserts and savoury foods.

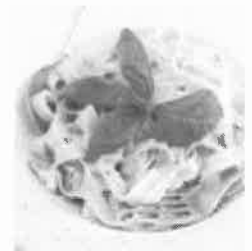


It has been made in Lombardy since around the 16th century. Most famously, the cheese is used in tiramisu, a layered dish with mascarpone cheese, ladyfingers, espresso, brandy and chocolate. It also appears in zabaglione, a rich Italian custard. Mascarpone can also be used to make frostings and to thicken puddings and creams for desserts, and it is popular as a standalone dessert, served with fresh fruit and sometimes a light syrup.

Mascarpone Pasta Sauce.

15 gr. butter
¼ cup milk
¼ cup chopped walnuts

250gr. Mascarpone cheese
¼ cup grated parmesan cheese
salt and pepper.

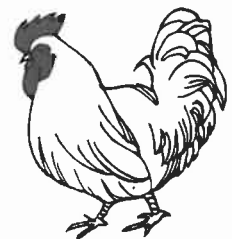


Melt butter in saucepan, before slowly adding the mascarpone cheese. Gently heat the sauce until smooth, add the milk and if necessary a little more milk to give a smooth creamy consistency. Stir in walnuts and grsted parmesan. Season with salt and pepper and serve hot with fettucine or tagliatelle. Serves 2 - 4 persons.

Chicken and Coconut Curry.

1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon flour
4 tablespoon vegetable oil
2 cloves crushed garlic
2 green chillies
1 ½ teaspoon cumin
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
4 oz chicken stock
salt and ground black pepper

3 teaspoon turmeric
1.4 kg chicken pieces
1 large onion
2 " piece ginger
3 teaspoon ground coriander
2 teaspoon garam masala
14 oz tin tomatoes chopped
2 tablespoon coconut cream



Mix salt, turmeric and flour together on a plate. Turn the chicken pieces into the mixture and coat. Heat the oil in a heavy based pan, add chicken and fry, turning frequently until all sides are golden brown. Remove chicken and set aside. Add the onion to the pan and cook gently for about 5 minutes. Add garlic, ginger, chillies, coriander, cumin garam masala, cinnamon and 2 tablespoon water. Cook for 3 minutes stirring often. Add the tomatoes and stock, bring to the boil then add chicken pieces. Cover and simmer for 40-50 minutes until the chicken is tender. Stir in the coconut cream and simmer for further 5 minutes. Season with salt and ground black pepper, sprinkle with coriander and serve with boiled rice.

Raymond Thomas Bell was born on 8th February 1916 and lived a happy life to 23rd June 2010. Ray came from Panania, Sydney to live at Tavistock Court in July 2001 residing at 152 (now 352) and main section from June 2007. Ray was known for his wit and happy nature and he enjoyed playing bowls at Torbay.

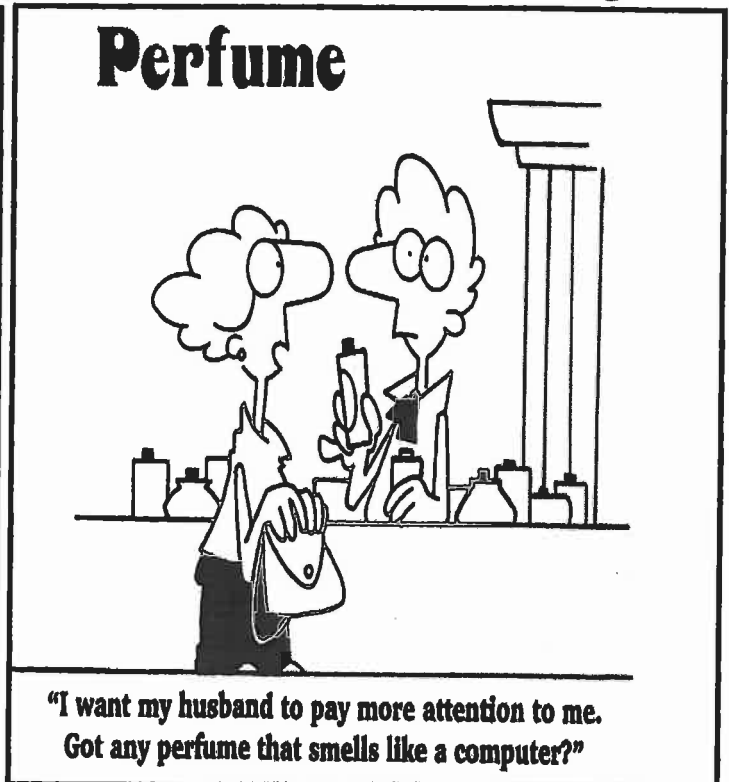

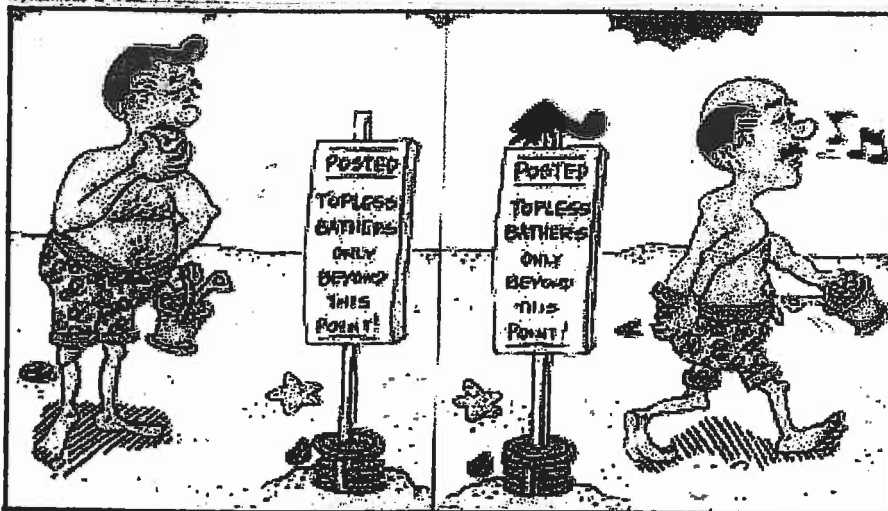
