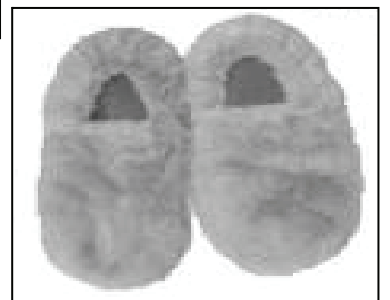

Such as shopping carts etc. It will also give us greater control over the formatting and updating of the website.

Accreditation

Parklands Site visit will be conducted on 12th and 13th of July. Accreditation for Torbay Retirement Villages is currently underway. The application is to be lodged by the end of May.

Security

We had a youth break into cars in the High Care car park this month. Due to the quick action of staff, the police were called and the youth was later apprehended.

Gophers

Thank you to all the villa residents who have already attended the licensing sessions. Licences have now been completed and sent out. A further two sessions were held on Friday 20th May one at 10am-11am and then again at 1pm to 2pm.

Village Caterer

Village Caterer has released their bulk meals to the public. We are currently using The Raw Sausage as our retail outlet. We will run with this for the next month or so and then look at expanding the product into other retail outlets. The feedback at this point has been very encouraging.

Computers

All residents are required to have Anti-Virus protection on their computers. This can be purchased on-line or most retailers. There are several products available, the most common ones are Norton's or AVG.

Future Building Projects

Building Division

- We have established a new division within Torbay to take responsibility for our building projects.
- The new building division, Torbay Constructions, will also do outside work to generate further funds for the organisation. We already have had people approach us about their projects.
- We are pleased to advise that we have appointed John Sheehan to head up this new division. He commenced work on 3rd May.
- The new division will control and organise all building work.
- There is no intention at this stage to purchase capital equipment for the work – we will use subcontractors. We do not have enough consistent work to consider using our own equipment.
- The Website of the construction division is already up on the net at www.construction.torbay.org.au

Work Underway

Redevelop Torbay Administration Building.

- ◇ The doctors room in Main Section is almost completed.
- ◇ The plan for the Administration office has been finalised and is currently being drawn up.

Administration Area at Production Kitchen.

- ◇ Construction of 3 offices so we can transfer all administration of the Caterer to the Kitchen site.
- ◇ We have had to apply to Council for planning approval as it was not covered in our original application.
- ◇ Work has been placed on hold awaiting Council's response.

Parklands Stage 1D

- ◇ This is the fitout of the first floor – carpets, curtains and furniture and equipment.
- ◇ We are reviewing carpet samples and colours.
- ◇ We are finalising our list of furniture and equipment before seeking quotes.

Parklands Community Centre Stage 1

- ◇ The Community Centre will go opposite the entry to the Aged Care Facility.
- ◇ The dam will have to go as there is a pool to go in with the first stage of the Community Centre.
- ◇ The Architect has finalised the plan and has been engaged to prepare the working drawings and to get building approval.
- ◇ We are reviewing the fee proposals from the various consultants .
- ◇ We still anticipate that work will commence mid year.

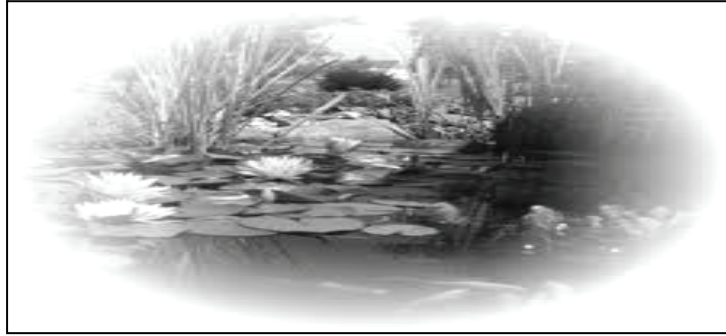

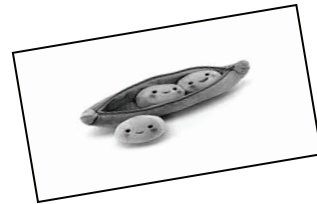
How to plant your garden

Culinary Corner

Gathering mushrooms. We can all remember the thrill of being the one to gather the most mushrooms at this time of year. The paddocks and farmers grazing land was never very far from home where we lived. You had to watch your step for cow dun, however as the eyes were always on the ground it was never a problem. I was always a bit wary of whether or not the farmer's bull was in our paddock. We compared our haul at the end of the day to see who had the biggest one. It was great fun as children and then again with our own children. Mushrooms are one of the highest antioxidant foods in the world. You may not have thought of the mushroom as a vitamin supplement, however a serve of mushrooms provides a healthy 'dose' of the essential B group vitamins riboflavin (B2), niacin (B3), pantothenic acid and biotin. Mushrooms also give a rich and unique flavour to many meals.



Chicken, Leek and Bacon Casserole

2 tabs olive oil	2 cloves garlic, crushed
40g butter	2 tabs fresh thyme leaves
8 chicken thigh cutlets	½ cup dry white wine
2 med. leeks, trimmed, halved washed and sliced	¼ cup plain flour
4 rashers bacon chopped	2 cups chicken stock
	200g button mushrooms, quartered



Preheat oven 180C/160C fan forced. Heat half the oil and butter in a heavy-based flameproof casserole dish over medium-high heat. Cook chicken in batches for 5 to 6 minutes or until golden. Remove and heat remaining oil and butter, add leek, bacon, garlic and thyme. Cook, stirring for 3 minutes or until leek has softened. Add wine, bring to the boil and stir in flour, cook for 1 minute. Slowly add stock, stirring constantly. Return chicken to dish, add mushrooms. Cover and bring to the boil, transfer to oven and bake for 1 hour. Remove lid and bake uncovered for 30 minutes or until chicken is tender. Serve with mashed potato.

Dark Cherry and Chocolate Pudding

1½ tabs cornflour	60g lightly packed brown sugar
2 tabs water	1/3 cup milk
1x415g tin dark pitted cherries,	2 tabs cocoa powder
1 egg	2/3 cup self raising flour
60g melted butter	



Preheat oven 180. Combine cornflour and water, heat cherries and syrup in saucepan over medium heat. Add cornflour mixture and stir for 2-3 minutes or until the mixture boils and thickens. Pour into a greased 4cup capacity shallow ovenproof dish. Combine butter, sugar and egg in a bowl, sift over flour and cocoa, add milk and beat all together. Spoon over cherry mixture and smooth the surface. Bake for 20-25 minutes or until cooked when tested with skewer.
